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ABOUT THE PIECE

The Library of Babel is composed for a large spatialized ensemble of variable instrumentation. It was commissioned and premiered by the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra, with William Rowson, conductor on Feb. 23, 2019.

PROGRAMME NOTE

The Library of Babel is inspired by the short story by Argentine author (and librarian) Jorge Luis Borges. In the story the characters live in a universe in the form of an infinite library. Each room of this library contains shelves of books with a seemingly random series of letters. It is theorized that the endless collection of books would contain every possible combination of letters, therefore every work ever written, and everything that ever could be written, including, somewhere, the index to the library itself. While my work is somewhat more finite it does have a series of melodic cells to be performed at the musician's discretion which are taken from an actual melody that never reveals itself.

PERFORMANCE NOTES

The Library of Babel has no full score but is an open form work comprised of a plethora of small melodic phrases with a timing number above each of them. There is no collective tempo, or pulse; the piece is coordinated by timers (stopwatch, phone, or clock, etc.) and musicians perform the phrases at their own discretion.

DURATION

This performance will be twelve minutes long. At 12:00 on the stopwatch the timpani will play one last note. Quietly finish whatever phrase you are playing and then stop.

INSTRUCTIONS

- Please do not play all of the phrases! They are only options to choose from. Play any that you like, that fits well on your instrument. Play somewhat sparsely, only a few phrases each minute.
- All phrases can be performed in any octave desired as long as a soft dynamic can be observed.
- The numbers above the phrases indicate the timing of when they could be performed. It corresponds to the SECOND on the timer that the note should be played, no matter what minute it is on. For instance, a note with a 37 above it could be played at approximately 0:37 and/or 1:37 and/or 7:37, etc.
- There is no order to the phrases at all. You can jump around to play any phrase on any page <u>as long as the phrase starts at the indicated second</u>. But accuracy is not paramount. If you miss the entry by a second or so it is fine.
- Players can pause at any time to breathe, to reflex, and to listen before proceeding.
- Accidentals apply only to the note they directly precede.
- The rhythm of each phrase can be quite rubato, in your own time.
- All phrases should last less than 6 seconds in total.

NOTE DURATIONS

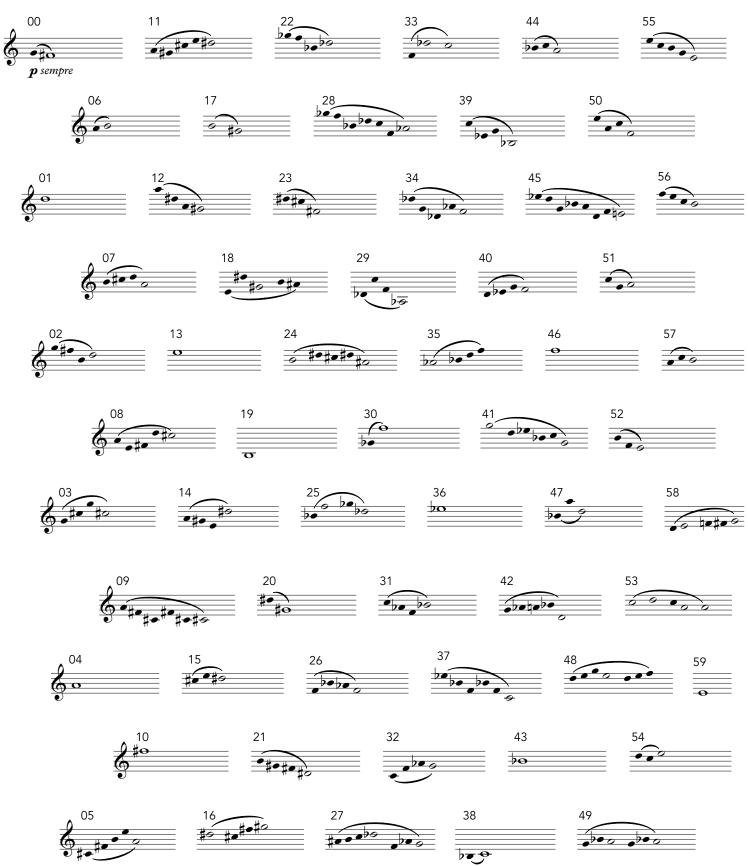
- = short (approx. 1 second or less)

- $oldsymbol{o}$ = long (approx. 5 seconds)

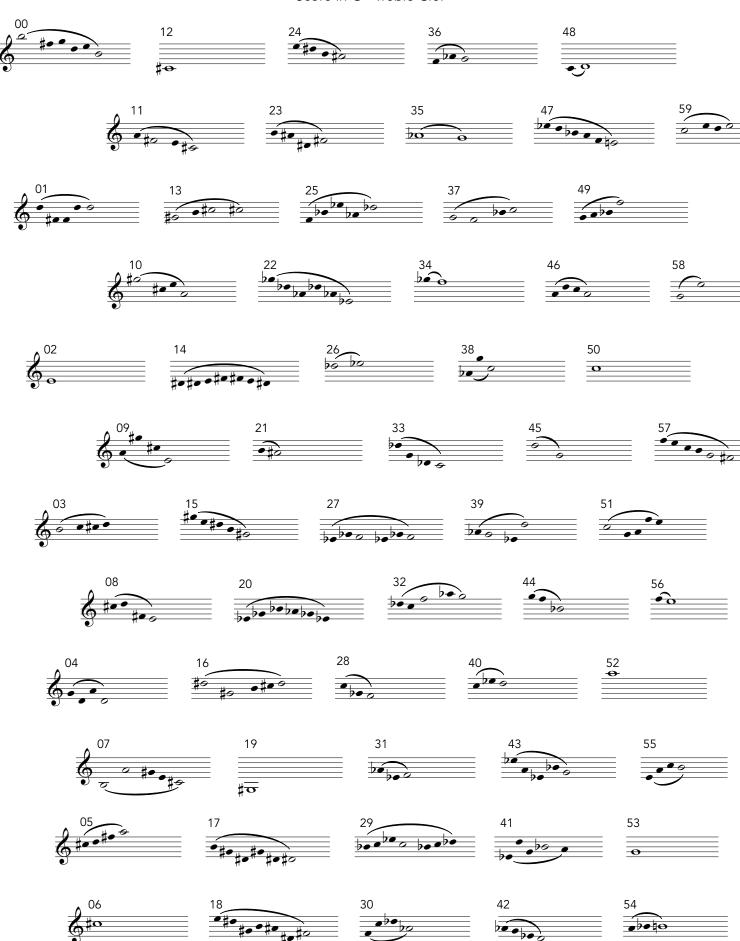
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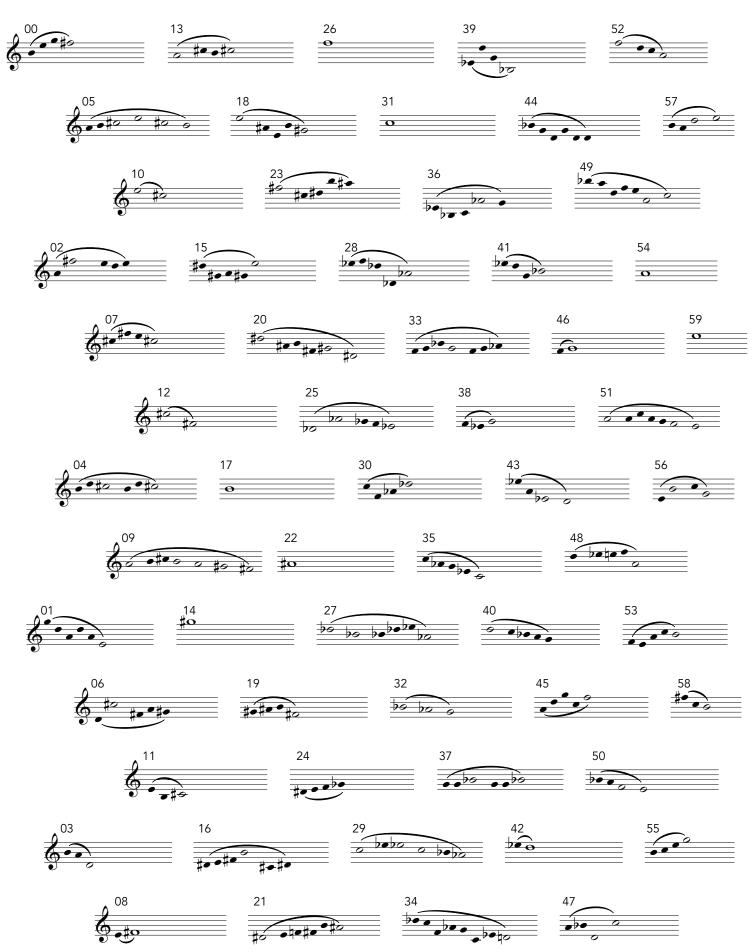
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Slowly and very freely. Accidentals apply only to the note they directly precede.





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
